What is a workshop?


• Workshops are small group courses with handson elements. Workshops are ticketed and required additional registration for a nominal fee. If you are more than 15 minutes late to a workshop, you can't get in.

What if I am late to a course?

- In an effort to keep the conference program on schedule, courses start promptly. Be early!
- If you are late to a general session, try to enter the room as quietly as possible and find a seat.
- If you are late to a workshop, you may lose your seat! Workshops are always in high demand and often sell out prior to the event. On-site wait-lists are used to fill empty seats. If you are late, your seat will likely be filled.
- If you miss a workshop, you can choose to attend another workshop that is not already sold out. Check in with registration on-site to work out your specific situation. Please note: Refunds will <u>NOT</u> be issued on missed workshops.

Will there be course handouts?

- General sessions will have handouts provided online approximately 30 days before the event. All preregistered attendees will be sent an email notice that the handouts are ready to be printed and downloaded.





Humans are designed to be nose breathers, but somewhere along the way, nose breathing can change to mouth breathing and reduced oxygen absorption. Adequate oxygen levels lead to regenerative sleep and the release of human growth hormone. Mouth breathing leads to lower oxygen absorption levels, poor sleep, and misdiagnosis of children with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). Normal nasal breathing involves the tongue being up, teeth apart, and lips together. In children, the tongue up during rest and swallowing provides the necessary stimulus for adequate palatal development. The tongue position associated with mouth breathing leads to compromised jaw development and a restricted airway. Mouth breathing is a predictor of sleep apnea. long face syndrome, and other developmental and sleep-related problems.

Dental hygienists often search for new ways to grow and advance their careers-mobile dOral cavity and oropharyngeal squamous cell carcinoma, commonly known as mouth and throat cancer, make up the great majority of cancers in the head-and-neck region. While traditional risk factors for these cancers include tobacco, alcohol, and areca nut use, the last few decades have seen a striking increase in another major risk factor for oropharyngeal cancer, oncogenic HPV infection. Cancers caused by traditional etiologies are marked by progressive carcinogen induced mutations, leading to field cancerization and tumor progression, and generally have a worse prognosis than the HPV-related cancers. With improvements in smoking cessation in many developed countries, human papillomavirus infection is becoming the most important risk factor and is responsible for the increasing incidence of oropharyngeal cancer. Tobacco, alcohol, and areca nut use continue to be the major risk factors for oral and oropharyngeal cancers across the world and particularly in parts of Asia. Regardless of etiology, oral and oropharyngeal cancer would be treated more successfully if diagnosed at an earlier stage. The current gold standard for screening, the physical exam, has limited sensitivity and specificity. Methods for early detection and assessment of potentially malignant oral disorders include visual and tactile oral examination, the use of light-based adjuncts such as autofluorescence, and narrow-band imaging, vital staining, cytopathologic platforms, salivary based molecular/proteomic tests, and other novel emerging technologies. Soluble CD44 and total protein are proteomic markers that are associated with oral and oropharyngeal cancer and poor prognosis. The markers can be elevated very early in the disease process. Studies are ongoing to determine whether these markers aid in early detection and will be presented in this session.

Human trafficking involves both labor trafficking and sex trafficking. The issue of human trafficking is worldwide without boundaries. The numbers of victims have continued to increase, and this issue knows no socioeconomic denominator with regard to perpetrators or clients involved in trafficking. The dental community and the medical community are in a prime position to identify trafficking victims and are in a position to act on their behalf in obtaining assistance for them. Most trafficking victims are seen as patients for medical or dental care during their captivity because of poor health or injury. This course will provide some clues that may indicate that your patient may be in a trafficking situation. 
